Sustainability. Foundry leaders recognize that being environmentally responsible and enhancing the bottom line are not mutually exclusive objectives. Often, a business case can be made for advancing environmental sustainability within a foundry. The AFS website now tells this type of great story via a section on "Sustainability in Metalcasting." # **AFS** releases wage and salary reports

FS recently released a pair of re-Apports detailing standard compensation practices in North American metalcasting plants. The reports can be used by foundries to attract and retain employees

and negotiate union contracts.

The 2018 Professional and Technical Salaried Report covers 15 management jobs, and the 2018 AFS Foundry Hourly Wage and Benefits Report includes 27 hourly jobs. They have information on wages, salaries, and benefits, including vacation time, insurance, raises/bonuses, retirement plans, and shift premiums.

The data, collected in 2018 from metal-

casting plants across North America, was compiled by Profit Planning Group, an independent third-party organization.

Both reports are available to download, as a set or individually, in the AFS Store at www.afsinc.org.

The reports are free to companies that participated in the surveys and can be purchased by non-participating companies at checkout.

# Experience powerful metalcasting relationships at summit

# Corporate Member senior VP speaks to House committee

ames M. Proctor II, senior vice pres-Jident and general counsel for AFS Corporate Member McWane Inc. (Birmingham, Alabama), testified before the U.S. House Committee on Transportation and Infrastructure on Feb. 26.

The special hearing was on "Examining How Federal Infrastructure Policy Could Help Mitigate and Adapt to Climate Change."

During his testimony, Proctor shared how technology would assist water utilities in saving water, and he urged for the adoption of policies that "foster more effective utility management," which would reduce utility operating expenses, consumer water costs and energy consumption.

# **OSHA** publishes crystalline silica **FAQs**

n Jan. 22, the Occupational Safety and Health Administration released a set of Frequently Asked Questions concerning the agency's final rule regulating occupational exposure to respirable crystalline silica in general industry.

For months, the American Foundry Society and National Association of Manufacturers had worked directly with the agency to craft the FAQs to provide metalcasters with additional guidance on key areas of the silica standard's requirements. OSHA began enforcing its respirable crystalline silica rule for general industry on June 23, 2018. The document is organized by topic. A short introductory paragraph is included for each group of questions and answers to provide background information about the underlying regulatory requirements.

"Through the association's Safety Committee, members, and staff, AFS was an important contributor to the formulation of the FAQs," said AFS CEO Doug Kurkul. "AFS will continue to look for ways to work with OSHA to improve the workability of this significant rule on the foundry industry."

AFS' safety attorney, Brad Hammock, developed a summary of the key interpretations from the FAQs, available at www.afsinc.org. Many thanks to a number of AFS members and the AFS Safety Committee for their assistance on the FAQs.

# **Board member** talks unfair trade on Fox News

FS Board Member Brad Muller ap-Appeared on Fox News on Jan. 22 to discuss the theft of intellectual property by state-subsidized Chinese businesses.

Muller, vice president of marketing for AFS Corporate Member Charlotte Pipe and

Foundry (Charlotte, North Carolina), told Fox News' William La Jeunesse that unfair trade practices by Chinese companies are "rampant." A Shanghai business is accused of stealing Charlotte Pipe and Foundry's name

and trademark and dumping inferior products into the market.

"They constantly are pushing the envelope," Muller said. "We just think it's a threat to our business and to our country."

The International Trade Commission ruled in Charlotte Pipe and Foundry's favor, but that has proven ineffective in stopping unfair trade practices, Fox News reported.

In addition to serving on the AFS Board of Directors. Muller is a member and previous chair of the AFS Government Affairs

# Wisconsin Chapter looks toward tomorrow at Regional

n its 81st year, the AFS Wisconsin Regional kicked off with AFS President Jean Bye (Dotson Iron Castings) announcing the direction of AFS and the success of the metalcasting industry.

The Wisconsin Chapter's Vice President and 2019 Regional Chair, Mike Kamin (Carpenter Brothers Inc.), is looking towards the future of metalcasting, too.

"Our success is bringing industry professionals with a vested interest in the foundry industry, and the future, together," Kamin said.

The AFS Wisconsin Regional is a yearly expo orchestrated with the help of the Stateline and Northeastern Wisconsin chapters. The two-and-a-half-day event, held annually at Milwaukee's Potawatomi Hotel & Casino, features more than 80 exhibitors and hundreds of attendees. Metalcasting students showcase their projects for a casting contest, and technical sessions hosted by industry leaders add educational value to the show.

To reach the Regional's future-focused goal, the Wisconsin Chapter enlisted the help of the Foundry Educational Foundation.

"New for 2019 was the introduction of a iob fair aimed at getting students and other industry professionals aligned with the recruitment needs of our industry," Kamin said.

Kamin knows what the job fair means to the industry. The skilled workforce gap is a serious concern for foundries and suppliers. With the addition of the job fair, the Regional connected metalcasting students with employers. The job fair got positive feedback, and organizers have already decided to bring it back in 2020.

"Our goal is to get more entrenched in the needs of our metalcasting facilities and suppliers who support our industry," said Kamin. "We want to see penetration in other facets of our supporting organizations like HR, quality, operations, production, and management."

# We asked, you answered: New programs from the Institute

II What training do you need and how do you want it delivered?"

These are the two questions that we have been asking the leaders of the metalcasting community. The answers are clear: more technical training topics, new operations and maintenance on-the-job training and new development opportunities for supervisors.

For the delivery of training, the AFS Institute has heard it is difficult to send metalcasting professionals to Schaumburg, Illinois, where AFS is headquartered. We hear that providing more classes locally would be helpful. We even hear many say that they would like an option for online training via

Zoom, Skype or some other simple conference calling platform. Also, one other common thing that we keep hearing is "customized, please!" And finally, we are hearing a need for

training that provides career pathways. More on that later.

We continue to hear great reviews of both our 37 instructor-led courses, and our 111 e-Learning modules! Thanks for the feedback! Our intent is to build on those two foundations.

Here's what is new from the Institute for 2019 and beyond:

Local classes: We will be scheduling workshops in other states! We will define geographic areas with a high concentration of metalcasters by alloy. Then we will propose appropriate classes for each area. Meanwhile, we will continue to partner with AFS Chapters that want to sponsor training locally.

New classes: We will be looking for and encouraging subject matter experts to develop and deliver new workshops. The Institute will become an opportunity for professionals to present their expertise and best practices to the industry, hosted and sponsored by the Institute.

Online classes: We will be piloting a live, online instructor led workshop. The workshop will take an eight-hour topic and present it during four, two-hour

www.afsinc.org for a recorded presentation and a copy of the PowerPoint.

In addition, AFS research funds were used to study industrial sweepers, which played a role in informing the formulation of which types of industrial sweepers are permitted under the standard and highlighted in the FAQs.

OSHA agreed to allow the use of industrial sweepers not equipped with HEPA filters, as long as the employer follows other applicable requirements in the standard (e.g., the hierarchy of controls to reduce and maintain exposures below the Permissible Exposure Limit [PEL]) and maintains the equipment in accordance with manufacturer recommendations.
