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# Workplace Safety Update: What's the Latest on OSHA's Silica Rule & Other OSHA Issues

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### Silica Standard

- Rule upheld by the D.C. Circuit
- Ongoing discussions between AFS and OSHA on FAQs:
  - Industrial Sweepers
  - Medical Surveillance
  - Housekeeping
- Development of feasibility checklist to assist foundries in finalizing compliance steps
- Compliance currently set for June 23, 2018 AFS and NAM seeking 180-day delay in enforcement

## Silica Standard Problem Foundry Areas

- As expected, we are seeing difficulty in foundries being able to achieve the reduced PEL on a consistent basis
- Problem areas include:
  - Shakeout
  - Blasting
  - Grinding
  - Housekeeping
  - Other?

## **Electronic Recordkeeping Final Rule**

- As of today, electronic submission:
  - Employers with 250 or more employees (includes part-time, seasonal, and/or temporary workers) in each establishment to electronically submit their 300, 300A, and 301 forms to OSHA annually
  - Employers with 20 or more but less than 250 employees in certain identified industries to electronically submit their 300A form annually
  - Employers who receive notification from OSHA to electronically submit their 300, 300A, and 301 forms to OSHA
- OSHA has not posted the data from employer submissions on its website and has denied a FOIA request for the data

## Electronic Recordkeeping Final Rule (cont'd)

- Employers required to develop employee injury and illness reporting requirements – employers must inform employees of the following:
  - Procedures for reporting work-related injuries and illnesses promptly and accurately
  - Employees must not be deterred or discouraged from reporting injuries and illnesses
  - Reasonable reporting procedures are required
- Employees have the right to report work-related injuries and illnesses
- Employers are prohibited from discharging or in any manner discriminating against employees for reporting work-related injuries and illnesses

## Electronic Recordkeeping Final Rule (cont'd)

- Rule challenged in two federal district courts
- Petition for Administrative Stay and Reopening of the Rulemaking Record submitted to the Agency
- New NPRM in development to, in part, reverse decision to make employers submit 300 Logs and 301 Reports
- 300A submissions expected to continue
- Initial round of submissions fell below expected numbers and OSHA has suggested citations could issue
- OSHA recently announced that employers in state-plan states that have not implemented the rule will need to submit the 300A data
- Unclear how NPRM will impact retaliation provisions

## **Beryllium Standard**

- Published in the final days of the Obama Administration
- Final rule applies to general industry; construction; and maritime
- Significantly reduces permissible exposure limit to .2 μg/m3 and establishes a short term exposure limit of 2 μg/m3
- Also includes numerous, burdensome ancillary provisions
- Rule has been challenged in the United States Court of Appeals for the Eighth Circuit; briefing has been stayed to allow for settlement discussions
- OSHA issued a direct final rule making miscellaneous changes to the standard on a technical level; OSHA will be issuing another NPRM to extend compliance

## **OSHA Penalties Are Up!**

- "Federal Civil Penalties Inflation Adjustment Act Improvements Act of 2015" = increased OSHA penalties
- One-time "Catch Up Adjustment"
- Yearly increases based on the Consumer Price Index

## **Key Legal Cases**

### ◆ Triumph Construction Corp. v. Secretary of Labor

Second Circuit affirmed that the period of time to establish a repeat that is set forth in the FOM is not binding on OSHA. OSHA is not restricted to looking back to only a certain period of time in classifying violations as repeat.

### Secretary of Labor v. A.H. Sturgill Roofing, Inc.

Occupational Safety and Health Review Commission looking at the issue of heat stress and the Secretary's burden of proof under the General Duty Clause.
